Message from the President

Spring has sprung and in keeping with Hickory Farms tradition, we will be holding two neighborhood-wide social events in early May. First is the Spring Cleanup on Saturday, May 5. I encourage you to meet with Grounds Committee Chair Bill Galinis at the corner of Farm House Lane and Cotton Farm Road at 9:00 a.m. Bill will provide assignments to help in the upper common ground, lower common ground, creek, north black path and entrances. Tasks will include mulching trees, trimming branches, picking up litter and planting flowers. We hope to be done by noon, but with 20 yards of mulch to spread, we might go a wee bit over. No problem—spend what time you can, since every helping hand will make a difference. If you are unable to join the working party, then consider dedicating time on that date to sprucing up your own property.

The next event is the annual Spring Fling, to be held in the upper common grounds (near the grove of trees), starting at 1:00 p.m. and going to 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, 12 May. This is a great chance to come out and meet your neighbors. We particularly encourage all the new residents (those moving in during the last two years or so) to join us. The HFCA will provide hamburgers, hot dogs, soda and condiments. We ask that you bring a dish (salad, dessert, chips and dips, etc.) to share. We have a lot of neighbors with origins in many other countries. We invite you to bring a dish from your native cooking tradition to complement the usual American cook-out menu to make this a Spring Fling with an "international flavor." (continued on page 2)

On a final note, although there have been only a handful of homes up for sale in Hickory Farms so far this year, they are commanding some pretty impressive prices. We will undoubtedly break the \$300,000 barrier this year. This validates our assertion that Hickory Farms is perhaps the best value in central Fairfax. To ensure that our property values continue to rise, we all need to do everything we can as a community and a neighborhood to keep our homes and streets looking their best.

We have a very good grounds service to do the common areas, including the Burke Station Road and Roberts Road frontages. I hope you have already noticed the difference there. But the real key is with each and every homeowner. We can make the biggest difference by doing just a few small things around our own property: edge lawns, paint trim, plant flowers, keep fences in good repair, etc. The Covenants spell out the legal requirements for appearance. The ACC helps to explain these rules, approve improvements and, where necessary, to enforce the standards of appearance. Bob and Lee Sottile are doing a great job for the neighborhood as co-chairs of this committee.

Once again, what we are asking for is what is termed "pride of ownership," which motivates people to go beyond the bare minimum requirements to make their property special. In this way, visitors and potential buyers will be impressed and we will all enjoy the special beauty of our special neighborhood. Pride of ownership will ensure that property values continue to rise; conversely, absence of it will take value out of our neighborhood. We would like to see every house in Hickory Farms be a home of distinction. Let's see what we can do this year to make that goal happen.

We may, in fact, have some new neighbors soon. Bluebirds have been spotted in the lower common grounds and appear to be building in more than one box. We'll keep you posted. Please do not approach too close to the boxes during this critical time. You can get a good view from the benches just up the hill. Happy Spring!

Warm weather is returning, baseball season is underway, and plans are being finalized for the Hickory Farms Spring Clean-Up. This year's neighborhood spring clean-up is scheduled for Saturday, May 5th from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon. If that time and /or day is inconvenient, I will be coordinating a work list that families and neighbors can "sign up" for, to work when your schedule permits. A sign-up form is provided below. It's a great opportunity for the kids to earn community service hours for their church or school. Spend a couple of hours on a community activity that will directly affect the area we live in—make it a family affair! Many of us were first drawn to Hickory Farms because of the neighborhood's appearance. Help us maintain that look. Don't leave this up to just a few of our neighbors. Take some time and help out.

Some of the tasks we plan to accomplish during neighborhood clean-up are:

- 1. Spread mulch around the entranceway flowerbeds and the common areas. We will have mulch delivered a day or two prior to May 5th.
- 2. Pick-up trash in and along the neighbor common areas. Bags will be provided.
- 3. Trim trees/brush in the common areas and along the paths on the property.
- 4. Install an erosion barrier on the wooded path along the south end of the property.
- 5. Spend some time sprucing up the old homestead—cleaning up leaves left over form the winter, trimming grass, and doing that "spring cleaning thing."

• Burglary Statistics

In Fairfax County statistics for 1999, there were 1,573 burglaries. Of these, 911 occurred during the hours of 6am to 6pm! (652 happened between the hours of 6pm and 6am, and 10 were unknown.) The trend continued in 2000 (statistics are not available yet), and other neighborhoods in the West Springfield district continually get hit by burglaries. It has been proven that Neighborhood Watches keep crime rates down in the areas that have them. Hickory Farms residents should continue to watch out for their neighbors so we can keep our neighborhood safe.

Vice President's Corner

• Braddock District Council News

On March 13, 2001, the monthly meeting of the Braddock District Council was held at Supervisor Sharon Bulova's Office. The meeting featured a presentation on the proposed Fairfax County Fiscal Year 2002 budget by County Executive Anthony Griffin and County Chief Financial Officer Ed Long.

Mr. Griffin used a version of the PowerPoint presentation that was delivered to the County Board of Supervisors as his background, but rather than simply reading that presentation, he focused on issues that were of interest to the Council, issues that were likely to be controversial, and issues that were attracting media attention. These included the revenue generated by higher assessed value of real property and the County transferral of funds to the Fairfax County School Board.

He explained that the recent increase in assessed property value was the result of an impartial assessment, conducted independent of County control. The rate at which property is taxed has not increased, but the County benefits from increased revenue as the result of the increased assessed value.


The county is proposing to transfer \$1.06 billion to Fairfax County Public Schools for School Operations. This amount is less than the \$1.09 billion requested by the School Board, a 10.8% increase over FY 2001. The level of State support to the Schools for FY 2002 is uncertain. This amount is in addition to other services provided to the Schools, including \$104.8 million in debt service, and \$44.1 million in new State mandated expenses, including additional Public Health Nurses and an expanded Substance Abuse Program.

Mr. Griffin was candid in his discussion of the budget situation. He said that he recognized that there would never be enough money to satisfy all interests, and that the County, in order to remain competitive, could not expect to substantially increase revenues. Fairfax County is trying to make the most of all available resources.

The next important date to mark on your calendar is the April 2001 Braddock District Council Meeting featuring our state legislators reporting on their recently concluded law-making activity. It will be held at Supervisor Sharon Bulova's office, Chapel Square Center, 4414 Holborn Ave. on Tuesday April 24. Be there at 7:30 PM and bring your questions to obtain answers from your state Legislators!

Springtime is always a busy time for the community, as people begin to beautify their property, whether through gardening, applying a new coat of paint to the trim or putting on a deck or other addition. HFCA likewise has a busy spring, with two major events: the annual Spring Clean-up of the Common Grounds and the Spring Fling. This year, we were blessed with beautiful weather on consecutive weekends and we had a great turnout for both events. It takes a lot of behind-the-scenes planning to make these two community endeavors work. I would like to thank the board members, particularly Bill Galinis for organizing the Clean-up, and Pam Barrett, Bob and Lee Sottile and Rita Mullin for their contributions to the Spring Fling. And I'd like to thank all the neighbors who turned out to help improve the appearance of our community.

The ACC, assisted by some other board and community members, will be doing a walk-around in early June to get a sense of the general state of compliance with our HFCA covenants. Of particular interest will be lawns (are they mowed, trimmed and neatly edged?), carports (are they cluttered beyond normal usage?), fences (are they in good repair?), attic vents and shutters (are they installed, in good repair and painted?). We would ask that you step outside and give your own property a self-assessment on these items. One way to look at it is would you like to buy the house next to your house, based on how your house appears from the curb? This is exactly the test that potential buyers and realtors use when looking at properties. And of course they will look at all the other houses up and down the street too.

After our walk-around, we will address any serious deficiencies with homeowners involved and offer suggestions on how to remedy them. We will also note in the July newsletters homes that are "Hickory Farms Homes of Distinction" based on overall excellence in exterior maintenance of house and yard. We really hope the latter list will be much longer than the former.

Please take the time to read the other articles in the newsletter. This has traditionally been our main way of communicating with everyone. However, we now have another high-tech way, via a new website. Hats off to Bob Sottile for doing the research and getting this set up. His article will tell you the particulars of how to log on and keep up with neighborhood news via the Internet. This should prove to be a really good way to pass the word, especially if something comes up between newsletters.

Home Security Tips

- Lock all doors and windows when you are not at home.
- If you are working or relaxing in your backyard, lock all doors and windows in the front of
 your home. Make sure that any unlocked doors or windows are within your view when you
 are working in the yard.
- Close garage doors when you are not actively going in or out of the garage.
- Install a deadbolt lock in the door from the garage to the house. Easy access to a garage provides a potential burglar with sufficient time unobserved to enter a door that is not secured with a deadbolt.

Hickory Farms Launches Website

As you probably know, one of the biggest challenges for any community is establishing effective communication. Work, family, friends, and hobbies all contribute to a busy lifestyle that leaves little time for direct communication. The Internet, though, is now making it easier and more convenient for people to communicate with each other on their own schedule.

We want to be a part of this more advanced and convenient form of communication, so our community has taken the plunge and set up an Internet web site. Rather than spend precious time and money developing the site ourselves, we have chosen to work with a company called CommunityPath.com.

CommunityPath.com, Inc. is the leading provider of interactive web sites, or "community intranets," for communities, and they are now providing us with our official web site. The

site offers us an abundant range of powerful tools and ensures privacy in our communications that will better serve all our community needs. The following are a few tools and benefits that we feel will be very useful.

Privacy - Our site is safe and secure. Only members of our community can access it. CommunityPath.com requires every user to register so that our appointed site administrator can verify that you are a resident of this community. With this kind of privacy we can freely discuss sensitive issues, post articles, and share private information that only members of our community need to know.

Calendar - Now you can post and read descriptions of upcoming events in the community. The Calendar feature allows the board and registered users to post events on the calendar for all the residents to see. Events are marked on a monthly calendar, and you can click on it to read about the details of the event. You can post anything from an upcoming PTA meeting to an upcoming high school football game.

News Articles - In addition to regional and national articles of interest, we can add local news stories to our site. This tool also allows us to put items from our newsletter online. Since we can now do this on the Internet, we will always be updated with the most current issues in our community. As a board, we won't have to wait for the next printing of the newsletter to inform you of important news and information about our community. Also, when we need to get urgent news out, it will be highlighted right at the top of the home page for every registered user to see when they log in.

Bulletin Board - Post a notice, get a babysitter, or find a tennis partner. The Bulletin Board is where our residents can interact with the site and with each other. Anyone who has registered with our site can post messages about anything of interest to the community. Are you having a garage sale? Invite your neighbors. Are you having an open BBQ? Let us know. It's a great way to keep in touch with your neighbors on your schedule.

Instant Survey - Weigh in on issues without having to attend meetings or write letters. The Instant Survey is one of the most powerful tools for our community. It allows us to get an accurate reading on issues in a matter of days or even hours. Let your views be known and see if the majority agrees with you. It will give us a very accurate picture of our community's position on an issue in a democratic forum.

Member Discounts - Benefit from membership in your community by taking advantage of discounts on services and products that have been negotiated by CommunityPath.com. Discounts include items like high speed Internet access.

Community Favorites - Find local vendors through the Community Favorites section. You can find a local restaurant, specialty store or product, or identify a painter, cleaners, plumber or any other type of service person that works in our area and find out what your neighbors think of their product or service before calling.

We hope that you take the time to sign on to our community intranet and check out the site. The board, as a representative of our community, is putting valuable time and effort into the site. With your participation and support, we are sure that this new site will play a key part in improving our communications and our community life for years to come. Architectural Review

During the next few weeks members of the Board of Directors and several of your neighbors will be conducting a walk-through of our neighborhood. If you are interested in participating in this walk-through please contact Lee Sottile at 703-978-1122.

Now is the time of year when that dreaded task of mowing the lawn becomes a necessary chore. The following is an excerpt from the County Code concerning lawn maintenance.

Code County of Fairfax, Virginia
Codified through Ord No. 44-00-G-9 adopted Dec 11,2000. (Supplement No 82, 12-00)
Chapter 119. Grass or Lawn Area 1
Article 3. Regulations and Procedures.
Section 119-3-1. Prohibited grass or lawn area height.

"(a) Developed Residential Property: It shall be unlawful for any owner of any occupied residential lot or parcel which is less than one-half acre (21,780 square feet) or any vacant developed residential lot or parcel which is less than one-half acre (21,780 square feet) to permit the growth of any grass or lawn area to reach more than twelve (12) inches in height/length.

If the lawn is in violation of the above code, the owner of the property is notified to correct the situation. If this is not done the county will come and cut the grass. The owner of the property will then be charged for the cost and expenses and may receive an additional fine of \$100.00."

Please remember that lawn debris is not to be disposed of in any common area and that trash receptacles and lawn debris are not to placed along the street until the night before pickup and all receptacles must be removed the day of pickup.

Cleaning Up Around Our Homes

In addition to the community clean-up, I noticed several folks who took the opportunity to clean up around their own property. This is *much appreciated*. As I mentioned in a previous newsletter, many of us were initially drawn to this area by its appearance. As citizens of this community, it's incumbent upon all of to maintain our property as well as the areas in which we live.

For those of us who haven't be able to spend as much time sprucing up around our homes as we would like, I would encourage us all to make the effort to do so. Keeping the grass mowed (especially with all the rain we've had recently) can certainly be a challenge during the spring and early summer timeframes. Lawns should be mowed before the grass gets to a height of 6 inches. Additionally, take a look at carports and other open areas. Okay, I'm off my soapbox. For the most part, we all do a great job in keeping up the appearance of our homes. For those of us who could do a little better, let's take make the extra effort and keep Hickory Farms one of the best neighborhoods in the area!

Message from the President

As promised in the last newsletter, here is the HFCA "2001 mid-term report" on how we are doing as a Board and a community towards the goals that were spelled out in the January newsletter.

- 1. Maintain the physical attractiveness of the neighborhood: We have placed emphasis on this goal in every newsletter, both in the President's Corner and in the ACC article. As promised in previous newsletters, members of the Board and the ACC did a walk-around of the neighborhood on Sunday, 24 June, to take a "snapshot" of appearance and compliance. We were looking for the obvious things. The results were generally pretty good. The great majority of homes showed compliance with the Covenants governing property upkeep and appearance. Some homes had only one noticeable departure from the standards, and a small fraction of homes had more than one departure from the standards. Shutters, broken or missing vents, lawn mowing/edging, weeding and trimming and carports seemed to head the list of those areas where just a little more attention would make a big difference in the top-to-bottom appearance of Hickory Farms. In addition to notifying homeowners in cases of discrepancies, we also wanted to point out "homes of distinction" where certain neighbors have done an exemplary job of maintenance and beautification (see separate list in this newsletter). These latter homes are an excellent example of what all houses could-and should-look like. ACC co-Chairs Bob and Lee Sottile continue to do a great job working with homeowners who want to make improvements to their property, and thus to the neighborhood as a whole. Grounds Chair Bill Galinis and an enthusiastic group of volunteers performed an excellent Spring Clean-up in May. Our grounds service is doing a great job and we added to the contract the care of the Burke Station Road and Robert Road frontages. With home prices moving steadily upwards (we have had three houses go for 300K+ already this year and another just listed in low \$300's), it is imperative that all of us do everything we can to keep our neighborhood looking its best.
- 2. Protect, preserve and where appropriate, enhance the common grounds: We've already mentioned the very successful Spring Cleanup. Bill Galinis is going to organize a follow-up project of removing some of the trees that were cut last year in the lower common ground. Speaking of that area, we had bluebirds look it over, but apparently they were driven off by English Sparrows. However, we had our first-ever nesting of a Tree Swallow, a very beautiful and beneficial insect-eating bird. We are investigating ways to eliminate the standing water problem in the lower common ground near the black path behind 10007 Cotton Farm Road. We may need to install a type of drainage system there to let the water percolate down. We may also get the County Arborist to come to Hickory Farms to give us an overall assessment on our trees and ways to eliminate some of the invasive plants (including poison ivv) that are choking out more desirable trees.
- 3. Increasing the participation of residents in community events. This seems to be going fine, with the Neighborhood Watch picking up a few new members to replace some of the folks who have moved this year. Welcome Wagon representative Ginny Herchert has met with several new neighbors and created interest in our activities. We had a nice turnout for the cleanup and the Spring Fling the following week. We will be working on the Community Yard Sale in September (Pete Scala is the organizer), and hope to increase participation over last year's successful event. We'd like to thank everyone who paid the 2001 dues on time; we have almost no

"collection" problems this year. A tip of the hat to Treasurer Chuck Bethany for so capably running the financial duties, such as collecting the dues, paying vendors and getting VPOAA packages into the hands of neighbors who are selling their homes.

- 4. Continue our strong working relationship with Supervisor Bulova. This year, we don't have all the drama we did last year with the cemetery issue (for an update of this, see the separate article elsewhere). However, we do have a storm water run-off problem that is affecting two residents at the end of Wheatfield Court. We have had two on-site meetings (for some reason, both were in the rain). Sharon's land-use guru, Florence Naeve, once again has helped nudge this along (although the budget battle has made this stretch out a bit longer than we would have liked). We will have another meeting at Sharon's office on 28 June. We'll keep you posted on this project, because when it starts, part of the northern "black path" will be closed for a while. We have received word that VDOT has approved a 3-way stop-sign for Cotton Farm/Still Meadow. Sharon has promised her support for this when it goes to the Board of Supervisors for approval under the "cut through traffic abatement" program. We should see the signs later this summer. Board VP Pam Barrett continues to participate in Braddock District Council (BDC) meetings, representing HFCA. As of 1 July, Pam will be the Chair of the County's Disabilities Service Board. We were represented at the annual BDC Barbeque at Supervisor Bulova's office earlier this month. This was a good way to maintain neighborhood visibility and also to show our thanks to Sharon for her help. We haven't had any issues to discuss with School Board representative Tessie Wilson this year, but did monitor the School Budget process, since it affected Woodson High School. There will be a bond issue for schools on the ballot this Fall.
- 5. Maintaining the peace and safety of the neighborhood through Neighborhood Watch and cooperation with the FCPD: We have had a few minor incidents of vandalism (mailboxes, egging, TP-ing, etc.) but by-and-large, Hickory Farms continues to be a tranquil and safe place to live. Our thanks to Watch Coordinator Kathy Gillette and all the members of the Neighborhood Watch for their efforts in making this happen. As noted above, we should soon have a new stop sign at Cotton Farm/Still Meadow. This should help with cut-through traffic. There is also a school bus stop there, so stop signs make sense.
- 6. Ensuring that the Board is open, responsive and consistent in carrying out its legal requirements: You are the judge of this. If you have any concerns, or have not received a prompt answer to a question, let me know. As you can tell by this and other newsletters, each Board Member is working hard to take care of the business of the community in a 'user-friendly' way. The biggest and best way we have to keep everyone informed is this newsletter. Board Secretary and newsletter editor Rita Mullin is doing a great job in getting this put together and out on time each month. We also have another way to pass the word with our website, which can be found at "communitypath.com." You will have to log in with a password of your choosing. The site is secure and your name/e-mail, etc. doesn't go to third parties. Bob Sottile gets the credit for making this happen. Please visit the site soon. We have had forty-eight neighbors already log in. (continued on page 3)



Vice President's Corner

• Good News from Supervisor Sharon Bulova

As discussed in previous newsletters, this year's county budget included a \$23 million shortfall between what the County Executive included in his budget and what the Fairfax County School Board requested. At the April 23 Board of Supervisors meeting, the Board shifted \$17 million from the county to our schools to bridge the gap. The School Budget will have to reprioritize spending to meet the budget minus the remaining \$7 million

Virginia Legislative Update

The topic for the April 24 Braddock District Council Meeting was the Legislative Update. Our Senators Leslie Byrne and Dick Saslaw, and Delegates Jim Dillard, Jack Rust and Vivian Watts gave a presentation on what happened in Richmond during the last Session.

The message was "there is still no budget agreement and it may not be possible to get one" (Senator Saslaw). Apparently it all boils down to "car tax or not to car tax." Originally the charge to the state when the car tax was fully eliminated was to be \$625 million per year. However, with the 45% car tax reduction of the current budget, it is already costing the state \$525 million. The cost at 100% phase out is being projected at \$1.3 billion.

One of the big targets for cuts would be the state universities, which are already funded way below other states. For example, while North Carolina funds its state universities at the level of \$14,000 per student. Virginia funds its universities at the rate of \$6,500 per student.

Senator Byrne told us the car tax is a "stupid" tax and expensive to administer, but its climination requires the legislature to take money from one pocket to put into another. What is needed is a new revenue source for the localities that could entirely replace the revenue that will be lost from the car tax. One option would be to piggyback state income tax with a set percentage designated for the resident's locality.

Other issues Senator Byrne discussed were her bill to raise the net worth amount below which retirees may apply for tax relief and the need to address the over crowding of residential properties.

In many cases, increased real estate value and the value of IRAs and pensions make it appear that seniors on fixed incomes are wealthier than they really are, and they are taxed out of their homes. Her bill to raise the net worth amount for seniors would help alleviate this problem.

To address the issue of overcrowding of residential properties, she introduced a bill to allow the building code to define what is a bedroom. Senator Byrne felt the bill was misrepresented in *The Washington Post*, and consequently voted down. She intends to reintroduce another version in the next Session.

Delegate Dillard had worked on a compromise between the House and the Senate to move the current 45% reduction of the car tax to 70% elimination. However, this was found not acceptable because the parties still could not find a way to fund state programs.

He was personally very disappointed that the effort to get a sales tax referendum to benefit localities for education and transportation was killed in the House, despite commitments by many delegates who did not follow through, or even show up for the vote.

Delegate Watts said that much of our current dilemma is due to the state's unwillingness to raise state sales tax during high growth years when many other states did. Now, with pressure to cut taxes further, the state simply cannot afford to cut the already low tax rate (Virginia ranks 47th in the country for state income tax)

and at the same time continue to fund its growing needs. She also was concerned about the state's continuing ability to fund health care and maintain minimum federal standards for nursing home staffing.

Delegate Rust was the lone dissenter on the subject of retaining the car tax or finding other revenue sources, and expressed support for its elimination and the Governor's budget. He believed a workable budget would eventually result without raising taxes to recoup any revenue shortfalls.

Fairfax Memorial Park Update

As you know, the Board of Zoning Appeals last year approved the construction of a funeral home/mausoleum/ crematory on the grounds of the Fairfax Memorial Park. As part of the approval process, the cemetery was directed to put up a wall on the back (northern side) of the building. Based on citizen input, the cemetery came up with a modified plan to shield the building with a berm and trees, instead of a fence. They have gone through the process with the County Aborist and with the surrounding homeowners' associations. I have been to two meetings on this. The plan is a good one and will create a nice bit of landscaping to buffer the proposed building from the north side. The cemetery is going before the BZA later this month to request modification of their Special Permit to install this berm and trees as directed by the Country Arborist. Construction on the building will probably not commence before 2002, because the cemetery has to work out several other site-plan issues with the County staff. They will also be constructing a continuation of the path that currently runs north from the Burke Station Road entrance. The continuation will go from the entrance to Braddock Road and tie into the sidewalk there. That will give Hickory Farms residents a safe walking path in either direction. They have established a surety bond for the project and have 18 months to do it.

We'll keep you posted on any other cemetery news.

A Note About Noise

The Fairfax County Noise Ordinance "promotes an environment for county citizens that is free from noise that jeopardizes their health or welfare or degrades the quality of life." Businesses and individuals are required to comply with these restrictions. Some specific prohibitions are:

7) Refuse collection in residential neighborhoods	9 p.m.	6 a.m.

(Note: recently AAA came through on a few occasions as early as 5:15 a.m.. The Board President called the company to object, and they said they would notify the route manager to prevent a recurrence. We will monitor the situation and take action as warranted).

The following guidance is from county sources: TV, radio, musical instruments and animals that howl, bark, meow or squawk frequently and habitually are declared a disturbance *any time* when plainly audible across property lines or through partitions. We have had two cases of this come up just in the last couple of weeks, prompting this article. To register a complaint, contact the county's Zoning Enforcement Branch at (703) 324-1300 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. During non-business hours, please call the Public Safety non-emergency number at (703) 691-2131.

Obviously, using common sense and courtesy will go a long way toward keeping our neighborhood the peaceful and quiet place that it always has been. Before calling the county or the Board, discuss any possible breach of the rules, e.g., early hours, weekends, etc., (and the list above is not exhaustive) with the neighbor or business that caused it. This usually solves the problem and maintains good relations all around.


A note about satellite dishes: As satellite dishes become more popular, please be aware that the dish is considered an antenna and must be installed on the roof.

Vice President's Corner

I recently took part in a televised Braddock District Town Meeting titled **Stop & Smell the Roses: Recreational Opportunities in Fairfax County.** Although I was on the panel to represent the Disabilities Service Board and publicize the development of a new accessible park with a playground for children with disabilities, I thought our homeowners would like some information about the wonderful park and recreation opportunities we have in Fairfax County.

The Park Authority has over 380 parks on nearly 20,000 acres. Specific facilities include a horticulture center, a working farm, an activities/equestrian center, eight indoor Recreation Centers, five nature and visitor centers, eight golf courses, an off-leash dog park, three lakes, two campgrounds, an ice skating rink, a Water Park and a working mill.

Fairfax Fast Facts from the Fairfax County Website

- Fairfax County is the largest County in Virginia; its 1999 population was 946,371—making the population larger than that of seven states (Alaska, Delaware, Montana, North Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming).
- Fairfax County, which covers 399 square miles, has 344,563 households with a median family income of \$84,000 as of 1997. The 1999 median market value of a single-family home in Fairfax County is \$238,185.
- Fairfax County is governed by a Board of Supervisors composed of 10 members--the Chairman, elected at large, and one member from each of nine Supervisor districts, elected for four-year terms by the voters of the district in which the member resides. The Board of Supervisors appoints a County Executive to administer the County Government. The County Executive serves at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors, carrying out the policies established by the Board.
- Fairfax County's public school system is the largest in Virginia and the 12th largest in the nation. School Board
 members are elected for four-year terms by Fairfax County voters. Because the School Board doesn't have the
 power to tax or incur debt, the local operating costs of the school system are provided from federal and state
 government funds and by transfers from the County Budget to the schools. Approximately 51 cents of each
 County tax dollar goes to schools.
- Out of approximately 25,000 counties and cities in the United States, Fairfax County is one of only 24 with three
 Triple A bond credit ratings—the highest credit ratings possible. This means that the County's bonds always sell at
 lower interest rates, saving millions of dollars each time bonds are sold.
- Fairfax County is one of the safest counties of its size in the nation and has fewer police officers per 1,000 residents than any other suburban area. Yet it has one of the highest levels of police service at one of the lowest per capita costs in the D.C. area.
- As of the 1990 Census, Fairfax County ranks number one in the nation in terms of the percentage of workers in
 executive, administrative and managerial positions and ranks sixth in the United States in its percentage of
 residents with a college degree.

long-time level of \$80 per year. Although the dues have not gone up, costs for insurance and and grounds maintenance, our two biggest expenses, have risen over the years. While we can still meet the expenses, it leaves very little margin for error, as Treasurer Chuck Bethany's article explains. It is prudent for any corporation to have a sufficient reserve. We don't want to have to dip into ours for normal operating expenses, because we would have no buffer for unexpected costs (e.g., repair to the paths, legal fees, etc.)

We will also be electing a new board. At this moment, it appears that only two of this year's board will be able to continue: Secretary Rita Mullin and myself. The Welcome Wagon coordinator, Ginny Herchert, will also stay on in this un-elected volunteer position. This year, we had a veteran board of people who have served many times in the past.

They won't be back, so I view next year as my chance to help train some new people in board operations for the future, in line with one of HFCA's goals to get as many people as possible involved in the governance of the association. So if you have been thinking about volunteering, now is the time. I'm not exactly Uncle Sam, but we do need YOU.

If you can't come to the meeting to discuss and vote on these issues, then PLEASE sign and return the proxy form. This enables us to have a quorum and to accurately assess the wishes of each and every one of you on the items subject to a vote.

Some Good News for the Neighborhood

We received some good news on two issues that we have been working for a long time. First, the County Board of Supervisors approved the funding to fix the house flooding problem affecting the Ambrogi's and the Cobb's on Wheatfield Court. The construction of storm water run-off controls will temporary close the black path when it begins. We don't have a date, but will try to let you know as soon as we do via our web-site. It will probably be in October or November. The Supervisors also approved a three-way stop sign for the Cotton Farm/Still Meadow intersection. This should be done within a month.

And in case anyone was wondering what those traffic counters were for on 9/17-9/18, they were part of a triennial traffic survey run by VDOT to measure changes in traffic in different

School Bond Referendum

At this year's election, there will be a bond referendum for the Fairfax County Public Schools. It includes funding for planning the renovations of Woodson High School, starting in 2004. There is a direct link between our property values and the quality of Woodson High School. Lots of WTW parents worked hard to get this line item added in this referendum to move up construction. Some people in Hickory Farms do not have children in Woodson, but many will, and many have in the past. We need to support this bond issue, not only for our own neighborhood interests, but for all the school children, present and future, in the county.

The HFCA Board meets every month on the second Thursday of the month. We rotate meetings from Board member to Board member monthly. The meetings are always open to any member of the Association, and to residents who are not members as well. In October, the meeting will be at my house (10003 Cotton Farm Road). Fly the Flag Proudly—and Properly

It is inspiring to see the flags flying around the neighborhood. The candlelight ceremony was also beautiful. There was a group of young people (presumably from Hickory Farms) at the Burke Station entrance waving flags on that night. On the subject of flag etiquette, here are a couple of pointers (adapted from the Public Law governing display of the flag):

- 1. Fly a clean, untattered flag. If you have an old, worn banner, it should be burned with appropriate dignity, not discarded in the trash.
- 2. If flown at night, the flag should be illuminated by a light.
- 3. The flag should hang or fly freely, and not hit or get hung up on branches, parts of buildings, etc. The flag should not touch the ground.
- 4. If hung horizontally, the canton (field of stars) should be to the upper left as viewed from the front
- 5. If hung vertically, the canton should be in the upper left as viewed from the front.
- 6. If flown with other flags (state, local, military service, etc.) the U.S. flag is to its right, (looking out from the point of display), the position of honor. It should also be higher than the other such flags.
- 7. No other flag should fly on the same flagpole as the U.S. flag (unless the pole is designed with an arm and hoists to support other flags in the lower position, such as you see at government buildings).
- 8. The flag itself should not be used as bunting.

HFCA Budget Increase Proposed

HFCA has not raised its annual assessment for some years. Much like you in your personal life, your homeowners association has also experienced general increases in many areas. Currently, our expenses exceed our income.


In three out of the last four years, our expenses have slightly exceeded our income [from anual assessments] for the year. For 2 years the overage was under \$310 [1998 - \$310 and 2000 - \$194]. This year [2001] the overage is anticipated to be approximately \$3,000. The overage for 2001 is higher than previous years because the Board voted to perform additional maintenance and landscaping of the common areas. Since our overall financial situation is good [savings \$15,000 and checking about \$10,000] the additional expenditures are not a problem. However, assuming that in 2002 we maintain the same level of maintenance as we have in 2001, we need to raise the annual assessment from \$80 to \$95 so as to ensure that our income [from annual assessments] for 2002 will at least match our expenses.

The Board has discussed expanding the maintenance of our common grounds to have a limited amount of grounds maintenance performed year around. After obtaining and carefully reviewing bids, we have identified a contractor to perform this potential future maintenance. We estimate that this additional effort will cost approximately \$1,000 per year. The additional maintenance will help enhance the beauty of our community, particularly at the entrances to the development. Assuming the Board decides to expand the maintenance of the common areas, we need to raise the annual assessment from \$80 to \$100.

While other expenses such as insurance, newsletters, and postage have increased, the largest increase is in maintenance and landscaping of the common areas. Your Board of Directors is dedicated to maintaining the fiscal integrity of the HFCA as well as ensuring that the common areas are adequately maintained without dipping into our reserve fund. Maintaining an adequate reserve fund is a prudent business practice in order to be prepared for unforeseen contingencies such as repair to paths, legal fees, etc. The Board recommends that you consider raising the annual assessment from \$80 to \$100 so as to allow some flexibility in management of our future expenditures.

Please plan to attend the HFCA Annual Meeting on October 30 at 7:30 at W.T. Woodson High School in Cafeteria A, when we will vote on this recommendation.

Message from the President

October is upon us. Next to May, this is the busiest month for the Association Board, since we have the Fall Cleanup, Fall Block Party (or "Oktoberfest") and the Annual Meeting. The first two are going to be held on 20 October, and the latter event will be at 7:30 p.m. on October 30 at Woodson High School (Cafeteria A).

It is very important that everyone take an interest in the governance of the neighborhood through its Homeowners' Association. Without people willing to volunteer time and effort throughout the year, we would be unable to sponsor social events and carry out the legally required business of the HFCA. You guessed it—I'm about to appeal for members to serve on next year's Board. All but two of this year's elected Board are stepping down at year's end. At press-time, we have two neighbors who have indicated their willingness to serve next year. That leaves us three short of the number needed to fully staff the Board. You, the members of the Association, elect the Board at the Annual Meeting, and the Board selects its officers and committee heads. Right now, it appears that we still need a Vice-President, ACC Chair and Neighborhood Watch Coordinator.

All these jobs require a basic commitment of time. We hold monthly meetings of between one and two hours depending on the issues, and there are tasks outside of that:

• The President and Vice-President, in addition to overseeing the Board's activities, also deal the bigger issues with Supervisor Bulova. This can involve coordination with her and her staff, attending meetings of the Braddock District Council, and even speaking at Board of Supervisors meetings (e.g., the cemetery issue).

- The Treasurer has to prepare the annual budget, collect dues, write checks and ensure
 the annual audit. He/she also picks up the Association's mail on a regular basis, provides
 VPOAA documents when a house is sold and works with our attorney to file liens in case
 of non-payment of dues.
- The Secretary has to keep the minutes of meetings, put out the newsletter and maintain records of correspondence.
- The Architectural Control Committee Chair directs the work of the ACC, which acts
 on home improvement applications. This involves handling the paperwork involved
 within a 30-day time frame. Occasionally, the ACC writes letters to residents who are in
 violation of one or more Restrictive Covenants and holds hearings to resolve such issues
 that are not otherwise corrected.
- The Neighborhood Watch Coordinator has to keep in touch with the Fairfax County Police on crimes, trends and programs. She/he recruits new members and writes up the watch bill.
- The Welcome Wagon representative (un-elected volunteer position) keeps track of new
 arrivals in the neighborhood, gathers information from the County and City of Fairfax
 and in company with the President meets all new people in person to welcome them to
 the neighborhood.

Time involved in these duties can range from a few to several hours a month, depending on the Board position, time of year and the issues. It also depends on how much creativity the person in the job has. Many Board members in the past have thought of new ways to do things, or projects, and they willingly committed time to make those things happen. So everyone has a piece of the action. The bottom line—it does take time to do the job right.

And what do you get in return? Mainly, you have a say in how your neighborhood is governed by the HOA. You get a chance to actively improve your neighborhood to make it a nicer, safer place to live. You get to meet neighbors you otherwise might not get to meet. You get to meet, in some circumstances, our elected officials and county employees. You gain more knowledge of County policies and issues. And you have fun at events like the Spring and Fall social outings. Sounds like a pretty good deal! So let's see, we have 198

HFCA Budget Increase Proposed

HFCA has not raised its annual assessment for some years. Much like you in your personal life, your homeowners association has also experienced general increases in many areas. Currently, our expenses exceed our income.

In three out of the last four years, our expenses have slightly exceeded our income [from anual assessments] for the year. For 2 years the overage was under \$310 [1998 - \$310 and 2000 - \$194]. This year [2001] the overage is anticipated to be approximately \$3,000. The overage for 2001 is higher than previous years because the Board voted to perform additional maintenance and landscaping of the common areas. Since our overall financial situation is good [savings \$15,000 and checking about \$10,000] the additional expenditures are not a problem. However, assuming that in 2002 we maintain the same level of maintenance as we have in 2001, we need to raise the annual assessment from \$80 to \$95 so as to ensure that our income [from annual assessments] for 2002 will at least match our expenses.

The Board has discussed expanding the maintenance of our common grounds to have a limited amount of grounds maintenance performed year around. After obtaining and carefully reviewing bids, we have identified a contractor to perform this potential future maintenance. We estimate that this additional effort will cost approximately \$1,000 per year. The additional maintenance will help enhance the beauty of our community, particularly at the entrances to the development. Assuming the Board decides to expand the maintenance of the common areas, we need to raise the annual assessment from \$80 to \$100.

While other expenses such as insurance, newsletters, and postage have increased, the largest increase is in maintenance and landscaping of the common areas. Your Board of Directors is dedicated to maintaining the fiscal integrity of the HFCA as well as ensuring that the common areas are adequately maintained without dipping into our reserve fund. Maintaining an adequate reserve fund is a prudent business practice in order to be prepared for unforeseen contingencies such as repair to paths, legal fees, etc. The Board recommends that you consider raising the annual assessment from \$80 to \$100 so as to allow some flexibility in management of our future expenditures.

Please plan to attend the HFCA Annual Meeting on October 30 at 7:30 at W.T. Woodson High School in Cafeteria A, when we will vote on this recommendation.

Architectural Committee

Recently the Board of Directors made a walk of our entire community and was really impressed with how well most of the homes are being maintained and updated. The overall curbside appearance is excellent, which makes it easy to understand how the value of homes in our community has surpassed the \$300,000 mark and will continue to rise.

We did note some homes that need some work and sent out 25 letters to the homeowners concerned. The most obvious problem appears to be the condition of our attic vents. Twenty-five years have taken a toll on the original plastic vents that the builder chose to install. They have deteriorated to the point that they crumble to the touch, and apparently many of them have been touched because they have holes through them. Some of the holes are large enough to allow squirrels and birds into the attic, which I'm sure none of us wishes to have.

The home improvement stores carry a vinyl version that will fit right into the rectangular openings and is relatively easy to install. I replaced mine several years ago and it took less than two hours. However, at that time the standar circular one was about an inch smaller in diameter than the current one, which made it a little bit harder, but still not that difficult.

During the past month the Committee has reviewed and approved the following improvements within our community:

At 4316 Still Meadow Road, replacement of the front entrance door; At 10110 Round Top Court, construction of a front porch; and At 10114 Spinning Wheel Court, replacement of the soffitt with white vinyl.

Message from the President

The 2001 Annual Meeting was very successful in my opinion. In addition to the twenty seven households who had one or both owners present (including a good number of relatively new community members to go with the "old timers"), we received 48 proxies. Thanks to all who took part for your support of this important HFCA function.

The two main items of business were the approval of the 2002 budget and the election of next year's Board. The budget was approved, along with an \$20/year increase in the annual assessment. Please refer to the Treasurer's article for details on the rationale for the increase, and a breakout of how the money is to be spent next year. The biggest line item is to pay for additional service to the common grounds. The first step in this can already be seen at the entrances at Burke Station Road and Roberts Road, where our maintenance company has trimmed and weeded, removed leaves, and planted cold weather pansies to beautify these spots.

The election for directors resulted in the following persons being selected for next year's Board. The Board will select its officers at the first meeting, but based on preliminary discussions, this is how it is shaping up:

As is customary near the end of the year, I would like to include an updated scorecard on Board activities and accomplishes for 2001. This is basically the report that I read at the Annual Meeting. It is organized around the stated goals for the Association:

1. Maintain the physical attractiveness of the neighborhood: We have placed emphasis on this goal in every newsletter, both in the President's Corner and in the ACC article. We did a walk-around of the neighborhood on 24 June to take a snapshot of appearance and compliance. We sent letters to about 25 homeowners, or just over 10% of the residents, who had more than one minor discrepancy or one major infraction. I am happy to report that many residents took steps to correct discrepancies and therefore contribute to meeting this goal. There are still a few folks who have not responded; we may have to hold hearings and in extreme cases, invoke our right to fine people for non-compliance.

In addition to notifying homeowners in cases of discrepancies, we also wanted to point out representative "homes of distinction" where certain neighbors have done an exemplary job of maintenance and beautification. The purpose of this is to recognize hard work by some and to encourage others to put in more effort on their properties. We like to use this as a means of positive motivation, rather than to focus on negatives and citing people who fail to live up to their homeowner responsibilities.

With home prices moving steadily upwards (we have had several houses go for 300K+ already this year), it is imperative that all of us do everything we can to keep our neighborhood looking its best.

- 2. Protect, preserve and where appropriate, enhance the common grounds: We held two productive clean-ups this year. We added some services to our grounds maintenance contract and anticipate additional services next year. We have a couple projects lined up for next year as well, things we didn't get a chance to do this year:
 - investigating ways to eliminate the standing water problem in the lower common ground near the black path behind 10007 Cotton Farm Road. We may need to install a

- a type of French drain there to let the water percolate down.
- We may also get the County Arborist to come to Hickory Farms to give us an overall
 assessment on our trees and ways to eliminate some of the invasive plants (including
 poison ivy) that are choking out more desirable trees.
- 3. Increasing the participation of residents in community events. Welcome Wagon kept busy meeting with several new neighbors. This is where we try to create initial interest in our activities. We did pick up a few new members for neighborhood watch, but still only about 25% of the neighborhood households take part in this important activity. We had a nice turnout for the cleanup and the Spring Fling the following week. The Fall Cleanup drew fewer people than we had hoped for, but some residents took the opportunity to work in their own yards that day. We had about 40 people at the Fall Block Party. It was a perfect day and we had hoped for more turnout. But those who attended had a nice time. We held a Community Yard Sale in September (Pete Scala is the organizer). We may hold one in the Spring in 2002. We'd like to thank everyone who paid the 2001 dues on time; we have almost no "collection" problems this year. Many neighbors took part in the candlelight vigil after September 11th.

We had four people volunteer to serve on the Board next year. They are all relatively new neighbors to Hickory Farms. We appreciate their willingness to offer their time and skills to making this a better neighborhood, despite the demands of work and families and other responsibilities.

- 4. Continue our strong working relationship with Supervisor Bulova. This year, we had two main issues that the Supervisor helped with:
 - Storm water runoff flooding problem on Wheatfield Court. We had a number of meetings both on-site and off-site, and wrote a letter to support budgeting for this project. Our work paid off with approval by the Board of Supervisors for funding for this project, which should be started sometime before the end of this year. This will temporarily close part of the black path at the north end of Hickory Farms between Country Squire Lane and Wheatfield Court.
 - Three-way stop at Cotton Farm/Still Meadow. This has been approved and we are awaiting installation.

We attended Braddock District Council Meetings. I am a BDC committee head for this year, which gives us a bit more visibility with this body. Outgoing two-term Vice-Presiden Pam Barrett was appointed by Sharon Bulova as Chair of the Fairfax County Disabilities Services Board, another plus for Hickory Farms. On 24 October, I attended the dedication of the Supervisor's new offices, located adjacent to the Kings Park Library at the corner of Burke Lake Road and Rolling Road, one block south of Braddock Road. These offices are much more centrally located and easier to find than the old offices at Chapel Square on Holborn Road in Annandale.

We had no pressing issues with the School Board representative this year. We were on record

as supporting the Bond Issue that will provide funding for W.T. Woodson renovations.

- 5. Maintaining the peace and safety of the neighborhood through Neighborhood Watch and cooperation with the FCPD: we have had a few minor incidents of vandalism (mailboxes, egging, TP-ing, etc., plus one abandoned stolen car), which most of which occurred right before Halloween, but by and large, Hickory Farms continues to be a tranquil and safe place to live. We notified people of crime trends in our area to make neighbors more alert. We have a good rapport with the FCPD, and have requested more police presence here in response to the rash of incidents cited above. More people on Neighborhood Watch would also enable us to improve security. We ask those of you who live around the common ground to be alert to the presence of groups of young people there, especially after dark. If you see what appears to be suspicious behavior, then we recommend that you note down particulars, then call the police, and let the Neighborhood Watch Coordinator know as well. Try to get license numbers. We have some reason to believe that some youths from outside the neighborhood are coming here, perhaps to drink or to "do" drugs. While the cold weather may put a damper on this, vigilance is still called for.
- 6. Ensuring that the Board is open, responsive and consistent in carrying out its legal requirements: In addition to tried-and-true methods of communication like the newsletter and just walking around and talking to people, we also have another way to pass the word with our website, which can be found at "communitypath.com." You will have to log in with a password of your choosing. The site is secure and your name/e-mail, etc. doesn't go to third parties. We update this site periodically, so please check it often.

All in all, it was a successful year for the Association. I would like to thank all the outgoing Board members for their dedication and expenditure of time on behalf of the neighborhood, and I would like to welcome the new Board members. We look forward to another enjoyable and successful year in 2002.

This will be the last newsletter for 2001. With that in mind, we wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and of course best wishes for the upcoming holiday period that will usher in the new year of 2002.

This year's annual meeting was well attended and was a success. In my mind, the highlight as the approval of the budget for 2002, which is presented below. The Board of Directors has worked hard this year to try to make our community and common grounds more attractive. We have for the first time in eight years a small increase in our annual assessment, which will enable us to keep up with inflation and to perform additional maintenance in our common areas. Architectural Control

During the past year the ACC has reviewed, and approved 27 applications by home owners to make improvements to their homes. Many have been upgrades for siding and adding decks. These type of upgrades are a big help in increasing our property values and it has been working. Most of the sales this past year have been over \$300,000 which is a nice jump over last year and many of the homes have sold within the first week of going on the market.

The Board of Directors made a walk through of our community and 30 letters were sent to home owners who have mostly minor problems with their property. The most common problem were attic vents. The original plastic vent the builder installed have deteriorated to the point that they just crumble to the touch, and by all appearances, many have been touched within our community because many of them have large holes in them. This allows critters (birds and squirrels) to enter the attic space and make homes. I am sure that no one wants that.

I recently replaced both of them for a neighbor on a split foyer style of home. The standard rectangular size is 18" by 24". The cost for the quality vinyl vent is \$28.15, including tax, at Home Depot. It took less than two hours to install them both. The hardest part was getting the extension ladder out, tying it on top of the vehicle, driving around the corner, and taking it back off. I highly recommend that you do not buy the cheap plastic version for around \$10.00 the little extra the vinyl version cost is well worth it. They are much easier to install, have a 40 year warranty, and look much better.

In another area, I recently came across a product that looks very interesting. Dura-Stone Epoxy Aggregate Surfaces. This surface can be used to repair some of the driveways that have been deteriorating within our community. It may not only be an option to repair your driveway, but I have seen several of them and am considering having it done just to improve the appearance of my driveway in spite of the fact that it has not deteriorated.

I have contacted the company and they gave me a price of \$5.50 per square foot. I also contacted a concrete company, and the cost to breakup, haul away, and replace a concrete driveway is \$8.00 a square foot. A typical single driveway within our community is 10 feet wide and 40 feet long. The price to replace a typical 400 square foot driveway, at \$8.00 per square foot would be around \$3,200. To resurface the same driveway with Dura-Stone would be around \$2,200. A \$1,000 savings. If you would like to talk to the Dura-Stone company, their number in Woodbridge is (703) 491-0335.

Of course the Board of Directors, Architectural Control Committee and myself can make no recommendation of this product, and highly recommend that you do your homework and check with the Better Business Bureau and check references before having any home improvement work done.

My wife and I have enjoyed serving on the Board of Directors and Chairing the Architectural Control Committee. The cooperation we have received from everyone these past two years is greatly appreciated. We would like to thank Jeff Bush, Bob Montgomery, and George Rosenkranz for all of their hard work on the ACC.
