Shooting Air Rifles in Hickory Farms – Correction

In last month's Newsletter, we said that discharging BB guns, air rifles, and paint ball guns are not permitted in Hickory Farms. Oops! Just a few months ago, the Fairfax County ordinance was changed to permit these items to be used on the homeowner's property. However, if the projectile could potentially land on another person's property, the owner of that property must first give their permission. You can safely assume that the Board of Directors will not give permission for anyone to shoot projectiles that could potentially land on Common Area property. Children under the age of 16 using a BB gun, air rifle, or paint ball gun must be supervised by a parent, guardian, or other adult supervisor approved by the child's parent or guardian. Toy bows are not subject to these restrictions. Regardless of the law changes, if you see <u>any</u> person shooting in such a manner that could endanger other people, please call Fairfax County Police immediately.



Are Your Window Shutters Faded?

Many Hickory Farms homeowners had their window shutters replaced about seven years ago during the siding/windows/roofing group purchase. Some folks have noticed that their shutters have prematurely faded. Kathy Gillette (Cotton Farm) has learned that Mid-America Siding Components (29797 Beck Road, Woxom, MI 48393 - part of Tapco Group), will replace the shutters under their lifetime warranty. If you would like to submit a claim, call 800-521-8486 and explain your fading problem. Mid-America will send you a claim form through the mail. Return the completed form along with 3-4 close-up pictures of shutters, one picture of the entire home, and your receipt from the installation contractor. The replacement shutters will then be shipped directly to you. A quick scan of the neighborhood indicates that the raised panel shutters are fading faster than the louvered shutters. If you are making a claim for faded raised panel shutters, you may ask for louvered shutters as replacements. Mid-American's warranty is for the shutters only; you will have to reinstall them yourself or hire a contractor to do the work (probably a few hundred dollars).

Free Home Security Inspections

The Fairfax County Police Department offers free home security inspections. A trained officer will inspect the locks, doors, and windows of your home and make recommendations for improvement. Outdoor lighting, landscaping, and other factors affecting the protection of your home from burglary also will be reviewed. Winter Sidewalk & Driveway Care

Never - ever - use salt on the driveway or sidewalk to melt ice or snow. Salt eats away concrete in the blink of an eye. Although using salt to melt snow and ice is convenient in the short run, you'll pay for it when you spend thousands of dollars for a new driveway. If you feel that you must use an ice or snow melting chemical, please ensure that the package says it will not damage concrete.

This Month's Home Maintenance Checklist

Lawn Mower Shutdown – After cutting the lawn for the last time this season: Let the mower run out of gas (this keeps the gas from gumming up over the winter). Remove and clean the spark plug – don't replace it just yet. Change the oil. Replace the air filter. Remove and sharpen the blade. Scrape off grass clippings under the deck. Apply a light coating of oil to the underside of the deck. Squirt a spoonful of oil in the cylinder and pull the starter rope a few times to coat the cylinder wall. Replace the spark plug.

Heating & Cooling Duct Cleaning – Have a professional vacuum the accumulated dust out of the ductwork every ten years or so – *if needed*.

Cleaning our Gutters – Overflowing gutters lead to ground erosion and wet basements. If you are surrounded by trees, you may have to do this Spring and Fall.

Furnace Humidifier Setup – If you have a furnace humidifier, make sure it is plugged in and set properly. Turn on the water supply valve. If you did not do so in the spring, scrape off mineral buildup in the water pan and replace the filter – if needed. Work the float arm back and forth to dislodge mineral deposits.

You may recall that the bridges over Rabbit Run (which runs behind Country Squire, Cotton Farm and Harvester Farm) washed away during recent storms.

"Junk" Cars

Under Chapter 110 of the Fairfax County Code, junk cars can be kept on your property only if they are completely screened or shielded from view. An "Inoperative Motor Vehicle" is any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer which:

- Is not capable of starting and moving under its own power; OR
- Does not display valid license plates; OR
- Does not display an inspection decal that is valid or displays an inspection decal that has been expired for more than sixty days.

To report an inoperative vehicle, call the Police Impound Section at 703-280-0716. Callers' names are not divulged. The Police can tow an inoperative vehicle if the owner does not get it in working order to remove it within ten days after receiving a violation notice.
