Invasive Plant: Tree of Heaven aka Paradise Tree

One of the most invasive plants in the United States is Tree of Heaven, which is also known as Paradise Tree. It is rumored that Tree of Heaven was brought to the U.S. by Chinese immigrants during the gold rush in California. *Ailanthus* altissima grows in 42 of our 50 states. It is a rapid spreader, and one tree can produce 350,000 seeds in a year. This invasive can grow in the crummiest of soils. It also produces a toxin which can keep other plants from growing in the area. No wonder this invasive is so rampant! Hickory Farms has many of these trees in the neighborhood. You can see a lot of Tree of Heaven at the edges of woods in our common areas. It also may pop up in your garden if you are not a vigilant weeder. See the picture below to identify Tree of Heaven. Make sure to properly identify it because it does resemble other trees, such as sumac and black walnut. Although it is difficult to remove and a very persistent plant, you can get rid of this plant by cutting back the tree and regularly cutting back the suckers that will emerge afterwards. Mechanical control (cutback) is the best way to get rid of this invasive, but it has a long taproot, so glyphosate (in Roundup) may be necessary. Read below if you need more information on removing this nasty pest and be very careful using herbicides if it is required.

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Should I Power Wash My Sidewalk, Patio, or Driveway?

Only if you are very, very gentle. Pressure washers – especially gas powered ones - deliver enormous water pressure to the concrete, powerful enough to actually dig out the rock aggregate which is part of the concrete mix. Once that begins, the concrete will begin to crumble, a process called spalling. However, if you really want to clean your concrete using a power washer, use it at the lowest power setting and keep the wand at least 1½ feet from the concrete. Better yet, use a concrete cleaning product available from Ace Hardware or Home Depot.

Give Our Postman a Break!

Things are tough all over for our mail delivery men and women these days. If you place your trash can on the street in front of your mail box, the mail delivery person has to step out of the van to deliver the mail. Do him or her a favor and keep your trash can at least six feet from a mailbox.

PLEASE READ THIS If You Plan To Sell Your Home Soon

When you sell your home, you will need to give the purchaser a copy of the Hickory Farms Virginia Property Owners' Association Act (VPOAA) Disclosure Package. This is required by Virginia state law. If you do not give a copy of this document to the purchaser, they could delay closing or even cancel the sale.

The Disclosure Package comes in two parts; both parts must be given to the purchaser. You or your agent should contact the Treasurer to arrange for the delivery of the Disclosure Package. Please request the package three weeks prior to closing in order to give the Treasurer time to respond. As a word of advice, however, do not request it *too* early. Should it take a long time to sell your house, the Disclosure Package information could become outdated. We recommend you request the Disclosure Package when you have a signed contract in hand.



Part 1 contains specific information about your property. You or your agent may request either a hard copy or electronic version. There is no charge for either. Please note that before Part 1 is sent to you, your property will be inspected by a member of the Board of Directors or Architectural Control Committee to determine compliance with the Hickory Farms Rules & Regulations and Restrictive Covenants. Otherwise, the letter will alert the purchaser that you (the seller) needs to bring the property into compliance before closing. If you do not do so, the purchaser could delay or even cancel the purchase.

Part 2 contains general information applicable to all homes in Hickory Farms. This 40+ page document is available for free download by visiting

Hickory%20Farms%20(Part%202%20of%202).pdf If you would prefer a hard copy to be mailed to you, please deliver a \$10 check to the Treasurer or send it to P.O. Box 2239, Fairfax, VA 22031-2239 (Please note: in-person delivery is preferred as the P.O. box is checked only once a week). Please allow ten business days from when the check is received by the Treasurer to the date the Disclosure Package can be released, as we must allow time for your check to clear.
