Greetings All,

It's hard to believe that the holiday season is upon us already. It's weird to see Christmas decorations in Costco in Mid-October.

I hope everyone had a fun and safe Halloween. This year's Halloween parade was fun. We couldn't have asked for a more gorgeous day. Thanks to the social committee – Patty Dudley, Dawn Dempster and Lynn Welch – for organizing and taking care of the details.

On October 23rd, we had our Hickory Farms Community Association meeting. The 2007 budget was approved, and you can see it below. A proposal was made to hire a management company to outsource certain Board of Directors tasks. After open discussion, the association voted against hiring a management company, mainly because the group did not feel that there was a substantial benefit based on the cost – meaning the more tasks we delegate to an outside firm, the higher our annual dues will be. And, although some tasks would shift to a management company, that doesn't necessarily equate to less work for the Board because the Board would still have to oversee the management company. Also, we felt that the hiring of a management company, perhaps more efficient in some ways, is a step toward making the community less neighborly.

At the annual meeting, there was a proposal to have a play area built by the association in one of the common areas. Because there are many things to consider before we can commit to do that (such as cost of construction and liability for injuries), a committee was formed of four residents to research the issue and report back to the Board.

Also, there was motion to raise the annual dues. The association voted against this action for now, because after discussion, the association felt there is enough money in the contingency fund and reserve fund which is meant to take care of our pathways and common area.

The new Board of Directors was elected at the meeting. New officers will be elected by the Board. Most of the existing Board members will stay over the next year. The new members will take their places on the Board on January 1.

Lastly, I just want everyone to consider what it is they like about living in Hickory Farms. A comment was made at the annual meeting that if every house volunteered one hour a year to the community, that would be almost two hundred hours of volunteer time for the

year. What kind of community would we have if we had half that number of volunteer hours? Please contact a Board member to volunteer. Their names are listed on the first page of this newsletter. Your contribution makes a huge difference.

Dumping on Common Grounds – Please Don't !

The common grounds are part of everyone's back yard. However, in several areas, yard debris such as grass clippings and branches are being dumped. PLEASE do not dump debris in the common areas. Besides being unsightly, these dumping areas draw rodents and other wild animals into our neighborhood. Your trash service will pick up yard debris separately for recycling from spring through fall. It will even pick up debris as part of your trash service during the winter. If you have been putting debris in the common areas, please move it out to the street on debris day or haul it to the Fairfax

County dump on West Ox Road. Although it may be wooded area, the woods can't decompose more debris than it generates itself. In other words, the clippings and branches you dump in the common area overloads the area's ability to decompose the material.

Fruit Sale by the Woodson Bands

Juicy navel oranges, plump grapefruit, tangy tangelos or tangerines, and crunchy apples: all are perfect for fall snacks or recipes! Through November 13, 2006, the W. T. Protect Your Underground Water Pipe

Every few years, we seem to have a rash of water pipe breakages. For some reason, some of our water pipes (the pipe that runs from the street to your home) are prone to failure. When this pipe breaks, *you* pay to have it fixed, and it could cost thousands of dollars. Protect yourself with a water line insurance policy *before* the pipe breaks. Dominion Products (a cousin of the electricity folks) offers an inexpensive water line insurance program for which most Hickory Farms residents would pay no more than \$60 per year; I'm sure there are other companies that offer similar insurance. The Hickory Farms Architecture Control Committee has up to 30 days to review your application for construction that affects the exterior appearance of your home. The 30 days begins from when the ACC actually receives the application. Since it could take up to a week for the ACC to receive an application that is mailed to the Hickory Farms post office box, the ACC suggests you deliver the application to the ACC Chairperson, in person. And, to save yourself time, it's never too early to submit your application. Approved projects do not expire. You could submit an application right now for a project that you don't intend to start until next summer.
